
Max's inspiring progress reflects the heart of RCS's mission of achiveing 'Progress For All Children' every day so they can gain future independence.



OUR BIGGEST CHALLENGES AND OPPORTUNITIES

AS WE CLOSE OUT 2024 AND LOOK TO 2025, OUR BIGGEST CHALLENGES AND OPPORTUNITIES REMAIN CLEAR:

- 43% of schools in the region report staffing has been a challenge and RCS is among those facing a challenge in recruiting, hiring, and retaining qualified staff. **In 2025 we will focus on professional development for our staff and recruiting committed educators.**
- Children with ASD are 400% more likely to develop unmet health care needs when compared to children without disability. Our Wellness and Nutrition Program will head into its third year with a focus on supporting both students and staff.
- 85% of adults with autism are unemployed. Our vocational program will grow in 2025 by building more partnerships with local organizations to better support transitions to career and life after RCS.
